



BAY AREA STUDENTS DISCUSS PLANS FOR CUBA TRIP Christian Raisner, left, said travel ban "legally is a myth"

Forty persons from the Bay area, mostly students, have already signed up for the trip, Raisner said. They must put up \$100 for travel expenses within this country, but the rest of the tab will be picked up by the Cuban Federation of University Students, he said.

Raisner, a senior at San Francisco State College, was flanked at yesterday's session by three veterans of last year's Cuban trip: State College students Eric Johnson, 20, and Luria Castell, 20, and San Francisco artist Robert Kaffke, 35.

They charged that persons who made the trip last year have been harassed by the FBI and State Department and have received threatening anonymous letters and telephone calls.

Three New Yorkers who made the trip were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury last September on charges they conspired to organize the project and for leaving and entering the country without valid passports. Their cases are pending.

Soon after the shooting, the windows of Soon after the shooting, the windows of a Rexall Drug Store were brothen by in angry group of young Negro men. Further down the street, around the Brystew-Huntere Point Community Center, several young men together with some of the Center's community workers and Youth For Service, began to organize what liker was called the Peace Furtol. This was only hours after the initial attack on the

That night the Patrol num-hered 50, Early Wednesday morning several radio broadcasts reported that violence had bro-ken out in the Fillmore District, However, one of THE MOYEMENT staff went down there and reported that only a few windows were broken and that all the streets lead-ing into Fillmore between Geary and Haight Streets were completely cordoued off by the California Highway Patrol, All was quiet. The radio reports during the week were full of hysterical announcements of new "vjolence" and "riots," Checking

sere Ball, of hysterical amountements of new "violence" and "riota", Checking them out, THE MOVEMENT found most of them not to exist or to be local fiss-fights between higherhood students. On Wednesday the 25th, the Peace Pa-trol demanded a meeting with Mayor Shelley, Governor Brown, Assemblymian Willie Brown, Assemblymia John Burton, and Congressionar Full Burran. The police assumed he was abot and at 5 pm closed off Third Street to all traffic. Then they marched up to the Community Ceater, firing over the beads of the crowd. All this time the Peace Patrol was trying to clear the streets. Some used bull horns and all wore black artibands.

In a MOVEMENT interview with Harold Brooks, Director of the Center, he pointed out that the shooting lasted 7 or 8 minutes, "Minutes before," Brooks recalled, "the kids were in the windows. The police must have known they were in there."

Only three newspapers have interviewed Brooks or anyone else in the building at that time, 'THE MOVEMENT, The BERKE-LEY BARB, and the NATIONAL CUARD-LAN. None of the Establishment press mentioned the mumber of children in the

"The children didn't expect the police would fire," Brooks said, "When the firing broke out, bediam followed, ustil 1 got them to lie down. I went out the front door to get them to stop firing and let the kids out."




1967 Straight Theater opening, with a representative sample of the San Francisco music scene at that time






















